Parish Council approved a 1.5% increase from my 2018 salary in the 2019 Budget that will be presented at our Annual Meeting of Parishioners. This is the percentage the Diocese has raised the minimum salary, which matches the 2017 Albertan CPI increase. This works out to a figure of \$81,151.00 for my 2019 salary.

This 2018 figure is an estimate, based on January figures and notes from the rest of the year.

St. Paul's 2019 Budget

The 2019 operating budget was prepared based on the Fiscal 2018 actual results and presented to parish council at our January 8th, 2019 meeting. Parish council has supported the 2019 budget with assumptions as follows:

- 1) 1.5% increase in salary components
- 2) 2.2% inflation applied to operating expense components
- Outreach budget/tithe @ 10% of 2018 Total offerings

 (Total offerings defined as: general, open & special offerings-Easter/Thanksgiving/ Christmas). Historically one-tenth of this Outreach Budget was allocated to the Incumbent's discretionary funds. General offerings are received by 3 sources: Sunday offerings, pre-authorized donations, and United Way offerings through parishioner's workplace designated donations. In June 2017 it was decided by parish council to allocate two-tenths of the Outreach budget to the Incumbent's discretionary funds (1/2 for outreach and 1/2 for inreach)
- 4) General offering budget for 2019 has been established as the amount required to balance St. Paul's to a balanced/zero-deficit operating budget. As a charitable/non-profit organization over the long-term this is an ideal objective: a break-even budget, minimizing surpluses and reducing deficit years. This balanced budget represents a potential increase of 1.5% or \$3,358 in general offerings during 2019.
- 5) \$500 specially allocated for Youth events for 2019 budget
- 6) \$350 funds transfer from Chattel-Worship items to partially offset/subsidize Music Ministry expenses
- \$3,500 budgeted income item for special fundraisers to be held in 2019. In 2018 we had budgeted \$5,000 for fundraisers and achieved \$6,777. Over \$2,000 raised from our annual birthday party fundraiser was allocated to the capital improvement fund (furnaces, etc.). Funds raised by our 2 youth fundraisers (chili cook -off and hot dogs for Veterans) as well Shrove Tuesday, St. Nicholas Day Tea were donated to worthwhile causes such as Calgary Interfaith Food Bank and Legacy Project for Veterans.

- 5) Our cleaning person, Baraka Mkakatu and our lawnmowers, Ashton St. Pierre and Declan O'Neil

Other than the operational, administrative, & capital costs of running & maintaining the church building and grounds it's important to consider the many ministries that we are supporting:

- Worship Services, Prayer, and Music Ministry
- Adult education, Youth Programs, Nursery & Sunday School
- Community Connection/Hospitality Events such as the Stampede Breakfast, end-of-summer BBQ, and our annual parish picnic
- Outreach from St. Paul's (consider both our financial and volunteer support to the wider community) & Inreach (Incumbent's discretionary funds, Pastoral Care/Shepherding ministries)
- Our apportionment supports not only the administrative costs of the Diocese, but also contributes to many of the Diocesan Outreach programmes as well

- NeST, PWRDF, CAWST, & all the organizations we support through our fundraisers
- Continued sponsorship/financial support of our foster child Desta Keweti from Sunday School & Secret Friends Christmas Fundraiser
- There are many people and groups who appreciate and use our church building facilities as meeting spaces, providing fellowship, or just passing through our grounds including ChildSafe Canada, TOPS, prayer groups, Diocesan events, EfM Alumni, performers in Christian Music Ministry, Christian Education workshops, the people of Lake Sundance and surrounding communities and others.

Observations on St. Paul's Finances

- St. Paul's cannot continue to sustain deficit years as our retained earnings position has reduced. Income will need to continue on an increasing trend. We will be constantly monitoring our expenditures to more closely match with our revenues.
- We have always been able to fully compensate our Incumbent in accordance with Diocesan Compensation Guidelines
- We have always been in a position to pay the full amount of our allocated fair-share apportionment to the Diocese
- We are able to achieve a 10% Outreach/tithe to support many organizations both locally and abroad
- Our retained earnings position at the end of 2018 had a balance of \$11,840. This is the accumulated surplus of St. Paul's. We also have no debts or borrowings from the banks and our mortgage is fully paid.
- We have balances totaling \$45,875 in Directed Funds (general) and \$10,065 (chattel) at the end of 2018. This includes \$6,854 in the Capital Improvement Fund; \$1,656 in the Equipment fund; and \$7,630 in the AV/ Technology Fund
- Our bank balance (current, savings & GIC account) totaled \$76,624 and we have good liquidity of our funds. All principal and interest amounts are guaranteed by the bank.

Treasurer's notes/comments accompanying the Financial Statements & Treasurer's Report

Income Statement

We had an excellent month during December with 5 Sundays, Christmas Eve and Christmas Day services. Our total offerings were almost \$27,000. Also, our 3 fundraisers (Birthday Party, St. Nicholas Day Tea and Christmas dinner/ pageant) generated almost \$3,900. St. Nicholas Day Tea funds of \$1,042 was donated to the Calgary Food Bank. Our net profit in the month of December alone was over \$8,800 which greatly reduced our deficit position.

Our general offerings increased by \$5,871 or 2.7% during 2018 and our special offerings decreased by \$1,083 or 8.6%. Our total income decreased by approximately 1.9% from the same time in 2016.

Other income (Hall rentals, flower donations, general fundraisers, course &workshop fees, and memorial donations) decreased by \$1,998 or 19.8% from 2017 levels. We no longer receive hall rental income from Cantare Children's Choir in 2018, however have added Childsafe Canada who rent our church facility.

We have experienced an increase by 14.9% or approx. \$2,070 annually in utilities/insurance during 2018. Some of this may be due to rates/usage or energy inefficiencies. We are looking into this to see how we can reduce these bills.

However, we had a 3.4% reduction or approx. \$520 decrease in our general maintenance. Our total expenses decreased by approx. \$8,350 or 3.1% from 2017.

We ended up with a net deficit of \$5,144 at the end of 2018. Our budget achievements during 2018 were: approximately \$17,235 short of our budgeted total income figure (6.3%) approximately \$14,934 under our budgeted total expense figure (5.5%). Christian Education expenditures decreased by \$10.195 during 2018.

Worship, communications, other congregational expense categories were under budget and experienced actual expense decreases in 2018.

Balance Sheet

We show approximately \$415 in our chequing account, approx. \$71,044 in our savings account and approx. \$5,150 in our Guaranteed Investment account. Over \$26,000 was disbursed from the NeST funds during 2018 to fulfill our commitment of 1-year financial support to our sponsor family. Detailed NeST statement is included with the 2018 financial statements. We acknowledge the generosity of St. Paul's, St. Stephen's and Cathedral Church of the Redeemer for their support of our joint refugee sponsorship program.

The Savings account is earning 0.8% per annum calculated on the average daily balance. The GIC investment secures our Business VISA credit card and earns 2.2% per annum (investment placed November 9, 2018 maturing November 9, 2019). Our Total Assets are \$77,071 as at Dec. 31, 2018.

Liabilities and Equity, directed funds, and directed funds-chattel balances are as per the balance sheets provided with the financial statements.

Treasurer's Reports

I have been giving regular reports and communications to parish council, corporation, and St. Paul's Parish providing numerical financial statements, reports, and comparisons against budget. As well I include regular articles in the monthly editions of Living Waters, attend meetings for St. Paul's, MCES and NeST and liaise with many of the parish ministries regarding any financial aspects of the church.

I encourage anyone who has questions or requires clarifications on any of the parishes' financial matters that they can contact me. It has been good working with parish council, corporation, parish leaders and so many people in the parish in this financial and administrative ministry for St. Paul's during 2018. As of this annual meeting of parishioners, I will have completed 5-years of service as Treasurer at St. Paul's.



Report of the Midnapore Church of England Society for 2018

The year of 2018 saw no major changes in the operations of the Society. The Directors held a meeting in March; and sponsored a family Barbecue on the Chapel Grounds after Sunday Services on a cool September $23^{\rm rd}$. Despite the

chilly weather, those who attended enjoyed grilled burgers, hot dogs, hot coffee, juice and homemade desserts. The event also provided an opportunity for a few visitors to check out the interior of the historic Chapel for the first time. Our Annual General Meeting and Christmas Social took place on December 13th. The Society continues to fulfill our mandate to maintain, repair and restore the Historical Resource that is the Chapel and its surrounding cemetery grounds on behalf of the Parish. The appearance of the Chapel, grounds and cemetery are being kept to a high standard and are a continuing source of pride to all concerned. Many thanks to Robert Worden for his continuing contributions in maintaining the Chapel, Cemetery, and Grounds and to Carol Ann Shaw for attending to the cleaning of the



interior of the Chapel and to Reverend Fergus for his continuing efforts to ensure that the Chapel continues to be a special part of the parish ministry, through his participation in our MCES meetings and the conduct of special services in the Chapel through the year.

MCES assets continue to be strong, with over \$340,000 being held as an endowment by St. Paul's which holds most of funds in trust in GIC's, with the interest on the fund being designated for the maintenance and repair of the Chapel and cemetery. Despite continuing low interest rates which hover around 2% per annum, the cost of utilities, insurance, repairs, and grounds maintenance continue to increase, and the Society welcomes the continued financial support of a few donors to ensure that we remain able to carry out our work. The Directors would particularly like to encourage donations in the coming year to assist in the reparation of some of the older headstones and grave markers in the Cemetery which are deteriorating badly. Donations can be made to "St. Paul's Anglican Church/MCES Trust Fund" 7 Sunmills Green S.E., Calgary, AB T2X 3P6.

We could not have carried on our operations without the assistance of Dan Brisbin as Treasurer in keeping the financial records and managing the accounts of the M.C.E.S.. The Directors would like to thank him for his commitment to the work of the Society and wish him every success as he moves on to new opportunities in the New Year. We look forward to continuing our close working relationship with the Vestry of St. Paul's in the future.

In the coming year, in addition to regular maintenance, we plan to do some exterior repainting on exterior areas of the Chapel that require it, with the exact date depending on weather.

Our next Directors Meeting will be held at the Chapel of St. Paul's on April 25, 2019 at 7:00 pm. Our Directors meetings are always open to all and we would warmly welcome any parishioner or any other interested persons to come along to our meeting. NEWCOMERS SUPPORT TEAM REPORT ("NeST") 2019

The Newcomer Support Team (NeST) came together in late 2015 as a partnership between St. Stephen's and St. Paul's in Calgary, with Cathedral Church of the Redeemer 'walking alongside' providing additional support. Our goal was to sponsor a Syrian refugee family to Canada. In May 2016 we were matched with a Syrian family of six (two parents, four children) through Immigration, Refugees and Citizenship Canada (IRCC) for a one-year Blended Visa Office-Referred (BVOR) sponsorship. A long and discouraging wait followed due to processing delays overseas. In June 2017, we were finally able to welcome our new neighbours face to face and bring them to a townhouse lovingly prepared, furnished, and stocked with food by NeST volunteers.

There was much to celebrate in 2018. After a year and a half on Canadian soil, the family has achieved almost all of the resettlement goals. There will be challenges ahead but their resilience and strong work ethic will serve them well. A huge thank you to everyone who has helped with this endeavour. It was a longer process than we first thought and teams and volunteers underwent transitions of their own, but what an amazing experience it has been and what a wonderful family we are now blessed to know.

Our official sponsorship agreement ended in June 2018. Friendships will continue, however. The family frequently expresses gratitude for all the support they have received and what it has meant to them in establishing their new life in Canada. We marked the first anniversary of their arrival in Canada with a group picnic in Edworthy Park, an event we hope to schedule annually for years to come. They in turn love hosting gatherings with beautifully-prepared Syrian food for "the group" as their time and energy permit.

The Household Goods and Financial Mentoring Teams were among the first to work themselves out of a job. The family does their own shopping and manages their household finances including paying bills online with the computers provided by the Technology Team. The Health Team had a busy year (cautionary tales from other sponsoring groups about dental expenses proved accurate) but Al Jbawis have been connected with resources as needed and are now managing their own health care needs. They use Calgary Transit and achieved further independence with the purchase of a second-hand vehicle in June. They have enjoyed celebrating birthdays and other special events with NeST folk. They have established friendships in both Arabic- and English-speaking circles.

Both parents have made remarkable progress in their English Language Learning (ELL). They are currently in Level 4 classes, with plans to continue their studies either full- or part-time as circumstances allow. This also opens the door to e.g. trades certification and future employment opportunities. The children are working hard at school and doing well. Ahmad is an exceptional high school student and ranks in the top of his class. Arabic-English interpretation is still required on occasion but the whole family is now able to converse in English and they are eager to hone this skill. At the family's request their NeST friends will continue to offer homework support and conversation ongoing, in a less intensive form.

NeST's monthly support payments to the family ceased at the end of June. Khalil has been working almost full time since late 2017 in addition to his schoolwork, and Ahmad also began part-time work in 2018. The family has an ambitious but solid plan to balance breadwinning and education going forward. The IRCC "travel loan" for their airfare to Canada has now been paid off. Clearing that debt will help establish their Canadian credit rating and help them move forward financially.

The NeST fund has a remaining 'nest egg' of about \$4464. The plan is to keep the account open until June 2019 (or until funds are exhausted) to use for eligible expenses required by the family, e.g. ongoing dental treatments not covered by their health plan. NeST will disband in June 2019. Any remaining monies will go to support the work of the Diocesan Refugee Committee.

Thanks be to God for bringing the Al Jbawi family safely to Canada to build a new life here, and for all those who have helped it happen. Pray for peace and for all those whose lives continue to be disrupted by violence and persecution.

Others are welcome to join our Nursery Ministry Team. You must have a love of children, be at least 13 years of age, and if possible a babysitting course.

OUTREACH REPORT 2017

During 2018, we continued our Outreach focus to support people's basic need for food, shelter, clothing and safety by disbursing 10% of annual givings to a variety of charities, as well as to our parish. At St. Paul's 10% of the

Outreach budget is dedicated to the Pastor's discretionary fund, and a further 10% is allocated to inreach for assistance to our parishioners. The remainder is distributed to local, national and international agencies. The Parish's financial situation this year made this a more challenging activity than usual.

For the annual donations 18 organizations were identified that met our mandate and used the majority of their income for programs. We contributed to the Primate's World Relief and Development Fund by way undesignated funds so they could use the money as needed for their many projects. We also donated \$4,000 to Habitat for Humanity through the Anglican Diocese of Calgary's challenge wherein the Diocese would match our donation. Some examples of the other agencies that received our assistance were ithe Salvation Army, Mustard Seed, FINCA, Canadian Foodgrains, Calgary Drop In, Next Step Ministry. In total we gave \$18,000 to worthy agencies.

Although the primary function of this committee is disbursement of money, we should acknowledge the other outreach activities organized by parishioners. Our thanks to Barbara Jean for the Mitten Basket, Pat for the Samaritan's Purse boxes, Laura Anne for the Pregnancy Care bottles, and Jane for directing the funds to the Food Bank from the St. Nicholas Tea.

This committee also arranged for a speaker for Reign of Christ Sunday so we can learn more about an agency that has received our support. This year we were pleased to have Louise Gallagher, Interim Executive Director of Inn from the Cold who described the activities and needs of this program.

SHEPHERDING MINISTRY

"Then Jesus told them this Parable: Suppose one of you has a hundred sheep and loses one of them. Does he not leave the ninety-nine in the open country and go after the lost sheep until he finds it? And when he finds it, he joyfully puts it on his shoulders and goes home. Then he calls his friends and neighbours together and says, "Rejoice with me; I have found my lost sheep."" - Luke 15:3-6

Shepherding (Lay)

Mission:

- To strengthen and encourage one another in the faith, by providing care and support for every member of the St. Paul's Anglican Church family, through the activity of the Holy Spirit in the Shepherding program. This care and support are expressed through Prayer, Availability, regular Contact and Christian Example (PACE).
- Ensure that no one is missed either in his/her presence for worship each week or in his/her absence from worship.
- Ensure that those who are chronically absent or those who have ceased to attend altogether for one reason or another are contacted immediately, and encouraged to return to fellowship.

Responsibilities:

- The shepherd will befriend the members of his/her flock; look for and greet them each Sunday, and generally take/show an interest in their well-being.
- If any member of the flock is absent, the Shepherd will make contact (usually by telephone or with a card via mail), to let the member know that he/she is missed; to give a friendly word of encouragement. Not an attendance record, no one should feel badgered.
- The Shepherds will keep the Head Shepherd informed especially if a member is hospitalized, sick, or having some special need or problem with which the Pastoral Staff can help.
- An effective Shepherd sometimes counsels, intervenes in times of crisis, and provides practical assistance as needed but also values the power of prayer in helping the individual.
- An effective Shepherd listens and provides comfort.
- An effective Shepherd realizes that sometimes a visit would be beneficial.
- Prayer must be the foundation upon which all Shepherding activity is based and initiated.
- If a member of the flock is moving out of the parish or city, the Shepherd should alert the Head Shepherd or the Church's office secretary about this.

Note: Two calls per month may suffice, unless circumstances dictate otherwise.
