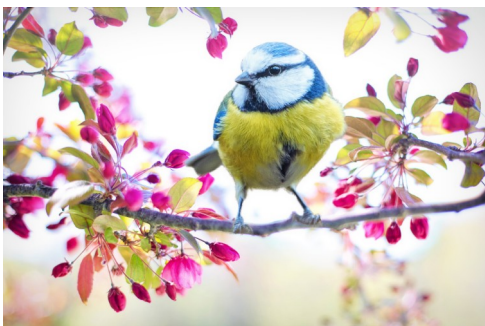

## INCUMBENT'S MESSAGE

### Fishing and Following: A Reflection on Peter's Call and Ours

*Jesus said to Peter: "Very truly, I tell you, when you were younger, you used to fasten your own belt and to go wherever you wished. But when you grow old, you will stretch out your hands, and someone else will fasten a belt around you and take you where you do not wish to go." (He said this to indicate the kind of death by which he would glorify God.) After this he said to him, "Follow me."  
(John 21:18-19)*

This year, on the Third Sunday of Easter, we look at one of the most beautiful parts of the Easter story: the restoration of the Apostle Peter as recorded in the 21<sup>st</sup> Chapter of John's Gospel. I don't get to preach on Easter 3 this year (we're blessed to have our Deacon Bob doing this), so I thought I'd share some reflections on this passage in this month's Incumbent's Message.

Peter, as we remember, had confessed that Jesus was the Messiah, and at the Last Supper had even gone so far as to say that if every other one of the disciples were to desert Jesus, he would remain true. And then that same night, as Jesus predicted, Peter denied three times that he even knew Jesus. The devastating effect on Peter we are left to imagine, being told only that he broke down and "wept bitterly" (Matthew 26:75 and Mark 14:72).

In the Easter story, we see Jesus' seeking out his lost sheep, to restore, heal, and reinstate him. The first encounter of the Risen Lord with Peter is mentioned in Luke 24:34 and 1 Corinthians 15:5. We're not told the details about it. It was just meant for Peter - a reminder of the uniquely intimate relationship each of us have with Our Lord. What we do know is that its effect on Peter was so profound that it convinced "the eleven and their companions" that Jesus had indeed risen, beginning the fulfillment of Jesus' charge to Peter in Luke 22:32.

But in the beginning of John 21, we see that Peter still needs to experience further healing of the deep wound in his heart. Just before Jesus first called Peter to discipleship, Peter had actually said, "Go away from me, Lord, for I am a sinful man." But Jesus had responded, "Do not be afraid. From now on you'll be catching people" (Luke 5:8, 10). At the start of John 21, we see Peter evidently feeling that he's disqualified himself for this mission of fishing for people. And so he says, "I'm going fishing" (John 21:3), or really, "I'm going back to what I'm competent to do - fishing not for people but for fish."

Then the same scene unfolds as when Peter received his original call. Once again, the disciples catch nothing. Once again Jesus tells them to put down their nets, and once they do, they receive a miraculous catch of fish (John 21:3-7). All of it sets the stage for Jesus to call Peter back once again to embrace the mission he has for him - fishing for people, drawing people to Jesus through his words and his deeds. Jesus has Peter affirm his love for him three times, undoing his threefold denial (note the charcoal fire in verse 9: the only other place in the Gospels where a charcoal fire is mentioned is the fire beside which Peter denied Jesus), and he affirms Peter in this ministry, saying that the only qualifications he needs are to love him and be willing to share his love with others, all of whom are equally dear to Jesus' heart (John 21:15-17).

Once Peter has affirmed his love for Jesus, and been affirmed once more in this most holy task, Jesus says the words quoted at the top of this page. He tells Peter that the very outcome he had so feared - feared enough to deny Jesus three times - would indeed happen to him. Peter would die because of his discipleship. Church tradition says that he was crucified (the words about stretching out his hands may indeed indicate this), upside-down, because he didn't consider himself worthy to be crucified in the same manner as his Lord.

But then Jesus adds two crucial words, the same words he spoke to Peter right at the very beginning, when he called him to leave his nets and become a fisher of people: "Follow me."

"Follow me. Leave everything. Don't try to go back to fishing. Follow me, and fulfill my purpose for you." And Peter does. Though he falters at times as we all do (the Apostle Paul mentions one instance in Galatians 2:11-14), he never again goes back on his commitment to follow Jesus as his disciple.

In his book *Blue Like Jazz*, Donald Miller shares about a story he heard a folksinger tell that helped him make the same decision:

*The story was about his friend who is a Navy SEAL. The folksinger said his friend was performing a covert operation, freeing hostages from a building. His friend's team flew in by helicopter, made their way to the compound and stormed into the room where the hostages had been imprisoned for months. The hostages were curled up in a corner, terrified. When the SEALs entered the room, they heard the gasps of the hostages. They stood at the door and called to the prisoners, telling them they were there to rescue them. The SEALs asked the hostages to follow them, but the hostages wouldn't. They sat there on the floor and hid their eyes in fear. The SEALs stood there, not knowing what to do. They couldn't possibly carry everybody out. One of the SEALs, the folksinger's friend, got an idea. He put down his weapon, took off his helmet, and curled up tightly next to the other hostages, getting so close his body was touching some of theirs. He softened the look on his face and put his arms around them. He was trying to show them he was one of them. None of the prison guards would have done this. He stayed there for a little while until some of the hostages started to look at him, finally meeting his eyes. The Navy SEAL whispered that they were there to rescue them. Will you follow us? he said. He stood to his feet and one of the hostages did the same, then another, until all of them were willing to go. All the hostages made it safely home.*


Following Jesus, Miller said, is much the same as this. We can do it, because he draws near, and becomes one of us. We look in his eyes and see his love for us. We know that he is our Good Shepherd, who is willing to pay any price for us, including laying down his life for us. We trust him to lead us safely home.

"Follow me," Jesus says: not "Go in front of me; not "Go where I send you, but won't go myself." Our Lord has gone before us, and has promised, "I am with you always" (Matthew 28:20). We shall never travel alone. We shall always journey with our Emmanuel, our "God with us," guiding us, equipping us, and enabling us to live as his disciples.

So this Easter, may we all remember that, like Peter, we are called by our Risen Lord to share, in word and deed, the Good News of Easter. When we struggle with our failings, may we remember that the only qualifications Jesus considers necessary are love for him, and the willingness to share his love with others. And may we remember that the way we live out this mission is not by running off in our own strength, to our own directions, with our own ideas, but by following him, journeying together with him, every step of this joyous journey home. Alleluia!

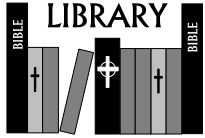


**Please note:** If there is only one person in the church the outside doors will be locked. Please ring the bell at the North door (by the apartments) to get access.

**Sunday Youth Bible Study** every Sunday morning during the 10:00 am service.

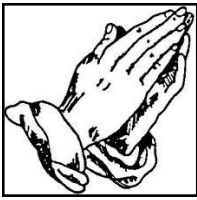

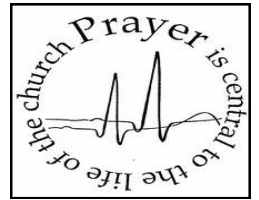

## New PWRDF Partner was in path of Cyclone Idai

In the remote and mountainous Chimanimani district of Zimbabwe, is one of PWRDF's newest partners, TSURO Trust. When cyclone Idai hit the country, TSURO was right in its path, and some staff members lost people close to them. An intern working with them died, one of the drivers lost his mother, and a board member lost six siblings and their families. TSURO has already organized emergency relief responses from its headquarters.

Chimanimani is remote and dry with mostly infertile soil and high levels of poverty, food insecurity, and malnutrition. Since TSURO started working in the district, the organization has positively affected 40,000 Zimbabweans by empowering communities with well sustained natural resources, contributing to improved health and food security, and promoting farmer initiatives and marketing businesses. This is achieved by working alongside traditional leaders and stakeholders who want to reduce poverty in Chimanimani.

Since the NGO has established a strong track record in local in communities and local government, it is therefore handling most of the relief work in the area, and has received supplies from international relief agencies.

It will be a long process but with support from us, it can be done.

*And the Easter Egg Hunt is on!*

What an exciting weekend for our Sunday School.

### Starting with Good Friday

-Some of the kids dressed in costume to enact the scenes of the crucifixion. At each station, Rev. Norman asked poignant questions of the participants about what Jesus might have felt **and** how we can relate to Him. One of our youth played the recorder at each station to lead us all in the Taize song, "Jesus Remember Me". Very moving. Very strengthening – both in volume and emotion! The last station, Jesus' body was left in the tomb.

-There were Hot Cross Buns and apple juice for everyone. And those who chose, made Empty Tomb Buns, to be baked and enjoyed Easter Sunday.

### Easter Sunday breaks forth

-The kids from the Good Friday service were asked to check out the tomb when they arrived at church. Behold the tomb is Empty and the Easter Lily points us to Jesus' resurrection. HE IS ALIVE.

-In the sanctuary, the Children's Talk says it again with a joyous song – HE IS ALIVE! The excitement is building. Off to Sunday School class.

-All the kids, teachers, and helpers introduced themselves to each other in a Big circle. We are learning our statement of faith song, "I Believe in Jesus". Then a couple of kids read the Bible passage with pictures, for Easter Sunday. We finished our little service with The Lord's Prayer.

-BUT today, instead of going into one of the three classes, it's time for. . .

### THE EASTER EGG HUNT

-The youth get wind of the Easter Egg Hunt and join in helping the little ones too. WOW, 49 of them altogether! Praise The Lord!!! It was heart-warming to witness our Youth quietly and eagerly show their compassion and generosity with both the younger children and the adults.

-Meanwhile, back at the Church (kitchen) those Empty Tomb Buns from Good Friday are being baked by Master Chefs Makayla Ford and Steve Colle. The children remembered from Friday how they each took a white marshmallow (*representing our Saviour*) and carefully dipped it in butter and cinnamon sugar (*representing the oils and spices Christ's body was anointed with*) and wrapped it in dough (*representing the linen He was wrapped in*) and left it for 3 days (in the refrigerator!). When they broke open the freshly baked bun...**Behold it was EMPTY! He is not there for He is Risen!** While the buns were baking, the marshmallow expanded made the dough rise and then melted away creating a delicious sweet cinnamon syrup in the middle (*representing the Empty Tomb*).

-All in all it was busy and exciting morning...from witnessing the Empty Tomb, to singing, to sharing an Easter Story, then praying together and meeting new friends; the Easter Egg Hunt and munching on empty tomb buns was a great way to finish the morning! Though we were prepared for 35 children and 49 participated (through the generosity of all) in hunting for 12 unique eggs to fill their egg cartons and pouring the contents into a bag to take home (or eat as many as you can before you go home?). The children also received a small bag of jelly beans in which included at least one of each of the colors mentioned in the Jelly Bean Prayer. The children were encouraged to share the Jelly Bean Prayer (attached to each bag) with their family and look at it as a visual reference and reminder of Christ and His gift to us.

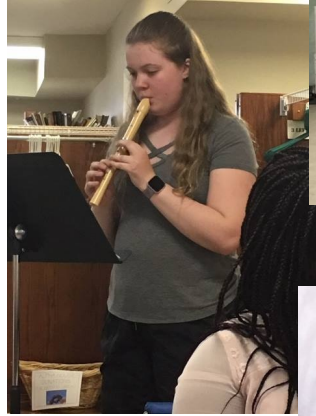
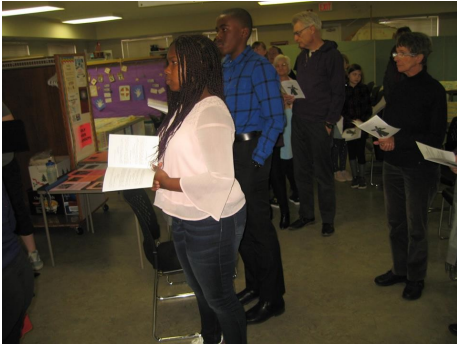

The International Day of Living Together in Peace **is a means** of mobilizing the efforts of the international community to promote peace, tolerance, inclusion, understanding and solidarity. The Day aims to uphold the desire to live and act together, united in differences and diversity, in order to build a sustainable world of peace, solidarity and harmony.

This Day is **an invitation** to States and leaders of all sides to continue to further promote reconciliation, to help to ensure peace and sustainable development, especially collaborating with religious communities, faith leaders, and other relevant actors, through reconciliatory measures and acts of service and by encouraging forgiveness and compassion among individuals and communities.

The celebration of this International Day of Living Together in Peace, in the respect for cultures and others is **an opportunity to take educational initiatives** and carry out **awareness-raising activities**, through the organization of events, but especially through an on-going formation to learn to live together in real life.
