# **Reflection on the Feast of All Saints**

Revelation 7:9-17 + Matthew 5:1-12

"Glory to God and praise and love / be now and ever given / by saints below and saints above, / the Church in earth and heaven."

So concludes Charles Wesley's venerable hymn, "O for a thousand tongues to sing." The hallowed vision of saints robed in white, genuflecting and joining together in a chorus of praise around a resplendent heavenly throne is as powerful as it is alluring.

Although many, if not most Christians shy away from reading

and studying Revelation, the apocalyptic vision of the enigmatic writer of Revelation helps develop our vision of what that "glorious company of the Saints in light" might look like. We're told that angels are gathered around the throne with four living creatures, falling on their faces worshipping God day and night, singing a song of praise. We're told that they hunger and thirst no more, and that sun and heat will not strike them

because the Lamb is their shepherd, guiding them to the springs of the water of life, as God wipes away every tear from their eyes.

And yet, as idyllic and unspoiled as this image is, it's incomplete.

The description doesn't stop there. The author of Revelation goes on to write that the "great multitude" gathered around the throne are those "who have come out of the great ordeal; they have washed their robes and made them white in the blood of the Lamb." Although literal readings of Revelation that condone violence are theologically problematic at best and downright dangerous at worst, we cannot deny that those who enjoy the place of honor in Revelation's apocalyptic vision have undergone suffering, and given the tone of apocalyptic literature in general and Revelation in particular, we can surmise that some have even endured physical violence.

What might this mean for a church that commits itself to striving for justice, freedom and peace? Or perhaps a more pressing question as we celebrate All Saints' Day is, what might it mean for Revelation's "great multitude," complete with their blood-stained robes, to be identified in the storied history of the church as saints?

The quick, albeit half-hearted answer is to do as countless others have done, and re-shelve Revelation as an indecipherable apocalyptic dream sequence written by an unknown disciple of the fledgling first-century Jesus movement.

But as wars rage on with ever-increasing frequency, as diseases and disasters continue to strike with indiscriminate and unrelenting cruelty, and as the unreliability of the global

> economy continues to provoke fear and anxiety and produce ever more poverty and inequity, we may know more than we think about these "great ordeals" and blood-stained robes that Revelation identifies so provocatively. And on this day in particular, perhaps the Spirit is calling the church to reconsider Revelation's apocalyptic witness – complete with all its harshness and unanswered questions.

In the midst of the violent imagery and occluded visions lays this powerful word of hope: After all is said and done, after the plagues of war and famine and disaster have done their worst, salvation belongs, not to the generals and the dictators and the power mongers of this world, but to God alone.

This is the great and enduring truth of the gospel, and it comes alive on this All Saints' Day, reminding the faithful that the powers and principalities of this world will not have the last word. In fact, not only is this Good News, we hear from the lips of Jesus himself that it is a blessing.

In a dramatic reversal of the customs of this world, Jesus foretells the truth of the Kingdom of God:

Unsure of your direction in life? You're blessed.

Caught under the weight of grief and loss? Joy comes in the morning.

Undervalued and not heard by those around you? God hears you.

Groaning with hunger pangs and longing for a moment of



respite? The comforter has come.

Sojourning for peace and righteousness, only to be trampled down by war and revilement, and those spreading lies to discredit you? God is travailing right alongside you.

The saints, Jesus reminds us, aren't simply those who seem to have it all figured out, whose prayer life is perfect, whose service to church and community alike are irreproachable, and who have left a legacy that the rest of us will spend a lifetime aspiring to realize for ourselves.

On the contrary: The saints, Jesus tells us and John reminds us, are those who have suffered greatly – and some who suffer still, even in our midst – and yet praise God all the more. The saints are those who have known the pain of grief and the sting of death, and still manage to find a way to sing, "Alleluia!" The saints are those who have been excluded and ignored by every corner of society and yet still find ways to seek and serve Christ, loving their neighbor as themselves.

And so when we celebrate all saints, we commemorate those worshipping in our pews who are suffering silently. We work to include those in our community who love God and neighbor, and yet find themselves on the margins. And we remember those whose worship of God is unceasing, even now that they have passed into light perpetual.

Our worship on this day, then, bears both the potential for difficult news that is hard to hear as well as the great and powerful news of a gospel that continually confounds even our best efforts to contain it. For if we approach this day, looking to the saints as nothing more than long-gone exemplars of moral and theological perfection, the witness of Jesus in the Matthew's gospel and of Revelation falls flat and bears little possibility for transformation.

But if we allow the Spirit to move in our midst, then we might be surprised by what we see when we look across the aisle of the church or down the street or into the parts of town that have a checkered reputation. We might be surprised to find saints there who, even in the most unimaginable circumstances, find ways to lift up their hearts in prayer and praise to God.

And when we hear those soft, but faithful notes of "Alleluia!" emanating from deep within the souls of the saints among us, we will know that salvation does indeed belong to our God, who is seated upon the throne, now and for evermore.

I was supposed to stay 3 months, but was told I'd exceeded their physio goals a month early! At present, I'm up to 4 hours a day on my prosthetic legs. I hope to increase this to 8 hours a day by next fall. The latest developments are that I no longer use a cane, and can walk up and down steps the "normal" way. I'm getting physio twice a week here in Red Deer to help me progress, focusing especially on balance and strength. Our new home in Red Deer is great, and I'm so enjoying our family's living all together.

I've been enjoying sharing worship online. I have to share, though, that I really miss my St. Paul's family. Thank you so much to everyone who has visited me; or sent me good wishes via cards, email, or Facebook. And thank you all for your prayers. I appreciate your loving support more than I can say. I've included the photo I posted on Facebook, with the caption, "Enjoying my new legs and new home." I wanted to have the photo show me in front of my books, because I so much appreciate the effort of all those who packed and transported the books and shelves for me! One plus from my new lifestyle is that I have more time and energy to read them!

# Why You Should Read the Bible Regularly

What you read impacts you. Think about how you feel when you read your news feed. Reading the Bible on a regular and consistent basis has several benefits. First, the Bible shows us God's character and provides us God's revelation of himself to his people. In each section of the Bible, we see God's holy, unchanging, faithful, gracious and loving character.

Second, 2 Timothy 3:16–17 when discussing the topic of Scripture says that it is "profitable for teaching, for reproof, for correction and for training in righteousness." The next verse goes on to say that this leads to the completeness and equipping "for every good work" (ESV).

Third, regularly reading God's word reorients our thinking so that we can grow in maturity, which is part of the Christian calling (Ephesians 4:14–16; Romans 12:1–2). Have you ever met a mature Christian who did not regularly read the Bible? These three things are really just the beginning, this list could include dozens of reasons why you should read the Bible on a regular basis.

A conversation between the Very Rev. Matthew Woodward and Dr. Don Taylor

**DEAN MATTHEW**: Don, so good to see you, I have really enjoyed moments with the Sierra Leonean community. Even the somber moments. Most recently I have participated in funerals, but I recall a remarkable baptism last year. These events have been full of food, full of community, and full of generosity. The Sierra Leonean community is so generous when their members are in need, is that always the way?

**DR. TAY LOR**: Yes, it is sad that you have experienced this recently around grief, but the same generosity takes place around weddings and baptisms also. The community gathers, supports one another, and gives what it can. This flows from a sense of communalism, that I believe is at the root of humanity. Many believe that civilization spread out from Africa, and this generosity is at the heart of African culture.



How does your family of origin express abundance at milestone events?

**DEAN MATTHEW**: I remember when I was introduced at that baptism. Everyone who had been introduced had danced to the front of the Hall, I looked at you, and realized I had to dance as well. But as I did, drawing on dance experiences from my youth, you and other elders of the community joined me and danced as well. I felt deeply supported.

**DR. TAY LOR**: Yes, I had to dance and support you, you are the priest of my church. Dancing is a manifestation of belonging. From this sense of belonging flows generosity. Everyone belongs, and everyone is supported, with food, with dancing, with fellowship and with financial support. To be rooted in abundance is to belong to a community who all want the best for you.

## **Sharing Our Faith Journeys**

#### Loraine's Faith Journey:

Ask and it will be given to you; seek and you will find; knock and the door will be opened to you. For everyone who asks receives; the one who seeks finds; and to the one who knocks, the door will be opened. Matthew Chapter 7, verses 7 and 8.

I take these verses from the Bible as living proof that God can be and is involved in our lives. My family was, I think, a typical family growing up in a large city. My parents were married in the Anglican Church and I was Baptized on a Sunday afternoon very soon after I was born. But that was the end of my church life. The church was mostly criticized and ignored in our home.

I was always aware of God. I believed He existed, but how would one 'know' that? I had many people in my life to help me on my faith journey.

The first was Miss Baker, who was my teacher for grades 4 and 5. This was my first introduction to the Bible, we were to memorize verses of



scripture. When I went home to ask if we had a Bible, my mother searched in her cupboard for a Bible. This Bible was the filing cabinet for newspaper clippings for births, marriages and deaths. I needed to locate the 24th Psalm so I could read it. Being a very poor reader, it took me some time to find and to read it, but I realized it was something very special. It still is my favorite Psalm.

The next was when the Gideon's presented each of us in Miss Baker's class with a new testament. I took to heart what the presenter had to say and started to read Matthew's Gospel; not an easy task for me. In the back of the Gideon New Testament was a place to sign my name if I wanted Jesus to be my saviour. I did not know what that meant. But I was a seeker, so I signed my name.

When I was about 14, I started going to church. I had never been to church; this was a new experience for me. That Sunday was the first Sunday in Advent and the Minister wished everyone a happy new year; it truly was a new beginning for me. I was confirmed in that church but still did not know Jesus as my saviour and friend.

When I was 15 my family moved to a new home in what had once been a farming community but was now a part of the city. There was an Anglican Church just up the street from me. It was built in the early 1800's. This was truly a new beginning. At this church, the Bible was explained in such a clear way that I could understand that I could know God personally. A whole new door was opened for me. There was a College and Career group that met after church on Sunday evenings, with much singing and Bible Study. It was within this group that I was discipled in the Christian life. Many who attended went on to full-time ministry. It was here that I would meet the man I was to marry. We spent the next 49 years together.

When I finished reading the New Testament, which did take me a long time, I could truly say I had found God; but He wasn't lost, I was.

Thank you, Lord, that my life has meaning and purpose in you. Please give me the opportunity to share my story with someone today. Amen.

# **Advent Candles**

#### First Advent Candle/Sunday: Hope

"Once in our world, a stable had something in it that was bigger than our whole world." – C.S. Lewis

It is only fitting that the first candle on the Advent wreath represents Hope – the first Sunday of Advent not only leads us to anticipate the birth of Christ but celebrate the beginning of a new liturgical season as well. The first candle is purple, the primary color of Advent and a color symbolizing royalty. Sometimes called the "Prophecy Candle," the first candle harkens us back to Isaiah's foretelling of the birth of Christ and all of the promises God gave us in the Old Testament that would be fulfilled by the birth of Jesus. This Advent, light the first candle on Sunday, December 3, 2023.





"May we be in this world a ray of that light which shone forth from Bethlehem, bringing joy and peace to the hearts of all men and women." – Pope Francis

The second candle on the Advent wreath represents Peace. Like the first candle, it is also purple. Often called the "Bethlehem Candle," the second Advent candle reminds us of Mary and Joseph's journey from Nazareth to Bethlehem before Mary gave birth to Jesus. Building on the meaning of the Prophecy Candle, this second candle recalls that after all of the division, destruction, and dispersion of the kingdom in the Old Testament, there might finally be peace on Earth – Jesus is coming, and so is his Kingdom of Peace. As we read in the quote from Pope Francis, this light of peace shone forth from Bethlehem for all the world. This Advent, light the second candle on Sunday, December 10, 2023.

#### Third Advent Candle/Sunday: Joy – "Gaudete Sunday"

"But the angel said to them, 'Do not be afraid; for see — I am bringing you good news of great joy for all the people: to you is born this day in the city of David a Savior, who is the Messiah, the Lord. This will be a sign for you: you will find a child wrapped in bands of cloth and lying in a manger." (Luke 2:10-12)

The third candle of Advent symbolizes Joy. As we continue to approach Christmas Day, our joy grows more and more. The third candle takes us back to the joyful anticipation of the shepherds who journeyed to see Jesus in Bethlehem, even before the wise men. On this third Sunday of Advent, which the Church calls "Gaudete Sunday," meaning rejoice or praise, we light the third candle and rejoice like the shepherds. For this reason, the third candle of Advent is called the "Shepherd's Candle," and its color is pink, the liturgical color for joy. This Advent, light the third candle on Sunday, December 17, 2023.

#### Fourth Advent Candle/Sunday: Love

"And in the end, everything else will turn out to be unimportant and inessential, except for this: Father, Child, and Love." – St. (Pope) John Paul II

The fourth candle of Advent represents Love, the ultimate love of God that He might send His only Son for us. Called the "Angel's Candle," the fourth candle of Advent is lit the Sunday before Christmas, and it is the color purple, leading us to eagerly await the new Kingdom of God on earth. This Advent, light the fourth candle on Sunday, December 24, 2023.

#### Prayer for lighting Advent candles — Henri Nouwen

This Advent prayer from Fr. Henri J.M. Nouwen encapsulates what many of us feel and hope for during the Advent season:

Lord Jesus, Master of both light and darkness, send your Holy Spirit upon our preparation for Christmas.

We who have so much to do seek quiet spaces to hear Your voice each day.

We who are anxious over many things look forward to your coming among us.

We who are blessed in so many ways long for the complete joy of Your Kingdom.

We whose hearts are heavy seek the joy of Your presence.

We are Your people, walking in darkness yet seeking the light. To You, we say, "Come, Lord Jesus!"



# All Souls Day

Though recently revived within the Anglican Communion, All Souls Day – also known as the 'Commemoration of the Faithful Departed', has been observed, in some form and on different dates, since the seventh century in the Western Church and the ninth century in the Eastern Church.

At the Reformation, All Souls Day was dropped from the liturgical calendar of the Church of England in reaction to erroneous medieval views and practices concerning Purgatory (Article XXII), however, the Articles make no direct objection to remembering the dead in prayer – in fact, in its service for

the Burial for the Dead, the Book of Common Prayer bids the congregation to implore God 'that we, with all those that are departed in the true faith of thy holy Name, may have our perfect consummation and bliss, both in body and soul, in thy eternal and everlasting glory'.

While we find no explicit mention of prayers for the dead in the canonical scriptures – apart from Paul's plea that the Lord grant mercy to the presuma-

bly deceased Onesiphorus (2 Tim 1:16-18) – remembering the dead in prayer and at the Eucharist has been a normative part of the Church's practice since its earliest days, and it finds support in the writings and homilies of the church fathers, such as John Chrysostom, who exhorted his listeners, 'Let us not hesitate to help those who have died, and to offer prayers on their behalf'.

But how, exactly, do our prayers help or benefit the dead if those who die in Christ are already assured of salvation (Jn 5:24) and if we can do nothing to change the condition of those who have irrevocably rejected God (Lk 16:19-31)? And what are we asking God to do for the 'souls of the faithful departed' when we pray that, through his mercy, they would 'rest in peace and rise in glory'?

The answer is that, though baptised into Christ's saving death and resurrection, all the faithful – living and departed – continue to be a 'work in progress' until Christ's return: 'Beloved, we are God's children now; what we will be has not yet been revealed. What we do know is this: when he is revealed, we will be like him, for we will see him as he is. And all who have this hope in him purify themselves, just as he is pure.' (1 Jn 3:2-3)

In his book on Mere Christianity, C.S. Lewis explains this point through an imagined conversation with Christ who says, 'Make no mistake... if you let me, I will make you perfect. The moment you put yourself in My hands, that is what you are in for. Nothing less, or other, than that. You have free will, and if you choose, you can push Me away. But if you do not push Me away, understand that I am going to see this job through. Whatever suffering it may cost you in your earthly life, whatever inconceivable purification it may cost you after death, whatever it costs Me, I will never rest, nor let you rest, until you are literally perfect—until my Father can say without res-



ervation that He is well pleased with you, as He said He was well pleased with me. This I can do and will do. But I will not do anything less.'

This purification – this 'purgatory' or purging of everything within us that resists or opposes God – this complete and final throwing off and laying aside of 'every weight and sin which clings so closely' (Heb 12:1) is why we continue to pray for departed believers, in the hope that God 'who began a good work' in them would 'carry it on to completion until the day of Christ Jesus' (Phil 1:6); and that being healed from the memory and wounds of sin, they are progressing 'from one degree of glory to another' (2 Cor 3:18).

On All Souls Day, and on other occasions, the Church invites us to remember in prayer our departed loved ones as an expression of our love and of our continued concern for their spiritual growth in Christ. As the biblical scholar and Anglican bishop, N.T. Wright puts it, 'I see no reason why we should not pray for and with the dead... Love passes into prayer; we still love them; why not hold them, in that love, before God?'

#### MEMORIAL PRAYERS

For use on All Souls Day or on other occasions such as the birthday or year's mind of departed loved ones.

If we live, we live to the Lord, and if we die, we die to the Lord; so then, whether we live or whether we die, we are the Lord's. (Romans 14:8)

God of hope,

grant that we, with all who have believed in you, may be united in the full knowledge of your love and the unclouded vision of your glory; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

A candle may be lit with these words:

Light immortal, you brought life and immortality to light through the gospel. May we, with (Name) and all the baptised, know the full light of your risen presence. Amen.



## **Missional Minute**



Our Diocesan Synod was held on Friday, October 13 and Saturday, October 14. It was truly a Spirit-filled gathering: decisions were made, information was provided, presentations that inspired and motivated were delivered, and new names were added to the lists of those who will lead and represent this Diocese in the future.

Our theme was Growing as Disciples of Jesus in a Post-Modern World, and in every presentation, we heard thought-provoking ideas of how we as Christians in the Diocese of Calgary can do just that - grow ourselves, grow our service within our parishes and grow in outreach to a world that is slowly turning back towards the Church. We were challenged in Archbishop Greg's address on Friday night to listen to the Spirit's voice and to be willing to trust in Christ to lead us. Dr. John Bowen of Wycliffe University offered seven signs of hope for the church, and encouraged us to come unto Jesus as disciples, and to be



"yoked" with Him, as He leads us in ministry. We heard greetings from the ELCIC, the Moravian Church of Canada, the Roman Catholic Diocese of Calgary, and our Companion Diocese of the Windward Islands. Each of these representatives reiterated support for our work together in our journeys of faith.

Jacqui Durand, our Archdeacon for Indigenous Ministries, led a presentation, beginning with a smudging and prayers led by Diocesan Elder Eric Crow Shoe, and followed by the sharing of stories of Senator James Gladstone by his granddaughter and Bishop Sid Black by his daughter. These moving testimonies of faithful leadership inspired those present, and continued the important work of bridge building between our communities.

At the close of Saturday, we heard from three diocesan groups offering missional hope for our parishes: Pilar Gateman, Archdeacon of Calgary and Executive Officer, spoke on the good work of the Missional Coaches, Jason Carroll, Ministry Developer and Elizabeth Short, Parish Health Facilitator, talked about their work assisting parish discernment, and Daniel Joseph in his role as our Diocesan Church Planter encouraged us in thinking about ways we can be welcoming within our communities.


